

## **Did You Know? Berkeley To Give 2,000 Men Work ~**

Moncks Corner, December 30, 1932. Special: Two thousand or more of Berkeley unemployed men will begin work on the county's roads, bridges, streets, schoolhouses and grounds, courthouse, jail, and other public buildings next Tuesday morning. Money to pay their wages will be obtained from the federal Reconstruction Finance Corporation through the efforts of the Berkeley County delegation and the County Health Department, whose recommendations to the state department have been approved and forwarded to Washington. The recommendations call for \$60,000 a month for the next two months to pay for public work.

The County Board for Unemployment Relief consists of Dr. W.K. Fishburne, county health officer; T.R. McKelvey, mayor of Moncks Corner; E.W. Stevens, member of the house of representatives; L.W. Bradwell, businessman, and Mrs. M.M. Murray, treasurer. The board met Tuesday night and a committee of three men from each voting precinct was appointed to advise the board. This committee met with the county board Thursday night and the following elections have been announced: Two county field agents, to have general supervision of the work, and handle the payrolls, Harmon Shipman, of St. Stephen, and D.T. Rhoad, of Strawberry.

Mrs. V.H. Ingle, of Charleston, former health nurse in this county, has been elected as county social worker and will be paid by the federal government. It will be her duty to visit the sick and physically unable of the county and recommend free doles for them. (A great deal of complaints have been made about the recent method of handling government flour and cloth.)

Orders were placed yesterday for 1,000 shovels, 260 axes, 260 bush hooks, and several gross rubber boots to be used by ditchers. The shovels arrived here this afternoon.
